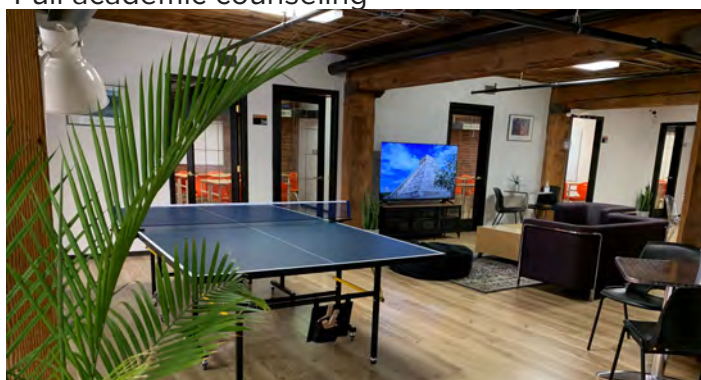

Afternoon Elective Courses

On the first day, new students will be registered in their afternoon classes. Continuing students can request to change their elective class any week.

Listening and Pronunciation:

Focus on the phonetic sound sets of English and learn how to make yourself better understood when you speak.

Power Speaking:

Tackling a variety of topics, create a weekly presentation and get helpful feedback from your teacher and your peers. Overcome your fear of speaking in English!

Career Readiness:

Ideal for students on Working Holiday visas, this class helps participants prepare to thrive in a Canadian workplace through improved communication, customer service skills, and cultural awareness.

IELTS Preparation:

Cycling through the four skills on the IELTS exam, this class prepares students to perform their best on the exam, or simply to develop their abilities in key language areas.

TOEIC Preparation:

Build your vocabulary and practice the listening and reading skills needed to succeed on the official TOEIC test.

Conversation:

Expand your ability to communicate in English and learn about other cultures while you discuss a variety of interesting topics. Conversation classes are a great way to put your learning into practice!

Each week will have specific goals, and at the end of the week, there will be a short quiz, assignment or presentation to measure your learning for the week and get feedback on your skills. These quizzes, assignments or presentations will form 50% of your elective mark, while 50% will come from your in-class performance, participation and attendance.

Elective marks will count towards your total percentage and can help you progress to the next level. **Scores will be calculated as follows: 80% Morning Class mark plus 20% Elective 1 mark for students taking 25 lessons per week, and 66% Morning Class mark plus 17% Elective 1 mark plus 17% Elective 2 mark for students taking 30 lessons per week.**

This means that if you get a high score in your electives, you can increase your mark needed to pass, so it is very important to attend your electives every day for continued progress.

ELECTIVE CLASS CHANGES

If you want to change to a different elective class, please see the Assistant Director of Studies.

Elective class changes take effect on Mondays, so requests should be made no later than Wednesday of the week before.

How CES Teaches English

At Centre of English Studies, we have been teaching English as a second language for over **40** years! Our methodology reflects both our experience in the field of teaching English and the current trends.

How you learn:

- Practice all of the English language skills: speaking, listening, reading, and writing
- Learn the structures of English to communicate correctly and effectively

Who will teach you?

The teachers at CES Vancouver are fully qualified according to Languages Canada and IALC standards. They will explain structure and functions of the English language, and will also set up a variety of tasks where you will communicate with other students. You will work individually, in pairs, in groups and as a class to get great multicultural practice with your classmates and to be able to understand different accents.

Who will you study with?

Centre of English Studies Vancouver hosts students from many different countries each month. Students are of different nationalities, ages and backgrounds. This means that you will have a chance to meet and talk with many different kinds of people on a variety of different topics, which is great practice for the real world!

How are you tested?

- To help you see your progress, you will be tested every week in your level. The weekly test will consist of a written test as well as an oral evaluation, based on the material you have covered that week.
- To move up a level, students who meet specific attendance and success criteria will be invited to write a Level test and complete an oral evaluation, based on the entire contents of the 12-week level. Level tests are conducted on Wednesdays; level changes will take effect from Monday of the following week.

FIRST DAY OF SCHOOL

Please arrive at the school by 8:30 on your first day. You will check in at the Front Desk.

- Lunch

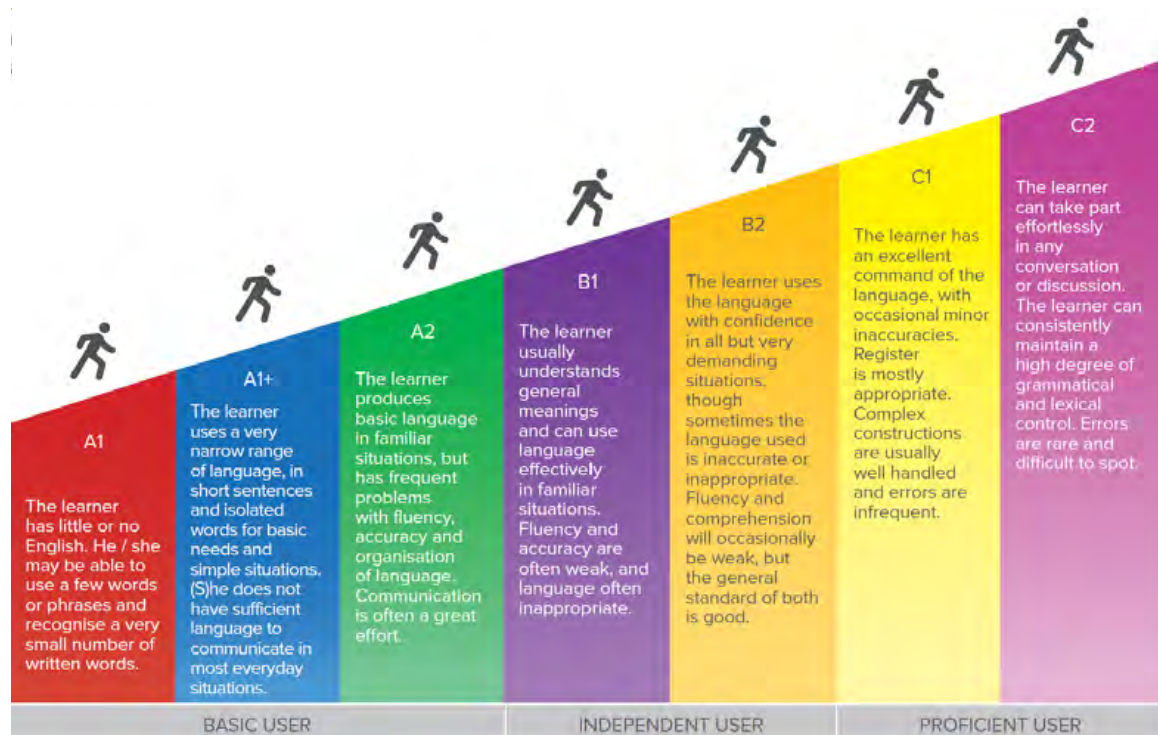
FIRST WEEK OF CLASS

On your first day, you will be provided with a form that lists the classes in which you've been placed. This will include the class name, teacher name, and room number for your AM, PM1, and PM2 classes (if applicable).

If you feel that your AM class is too easy or too difficult, please speak with the Assistant Director of Studies by Wednesday of your first week.

CLASS LEVELS

There are seven levels in the General English Program at Centre of English Studies Vancouver (GE1~GE7), which correspond to the CEFR levels (A1-C2).



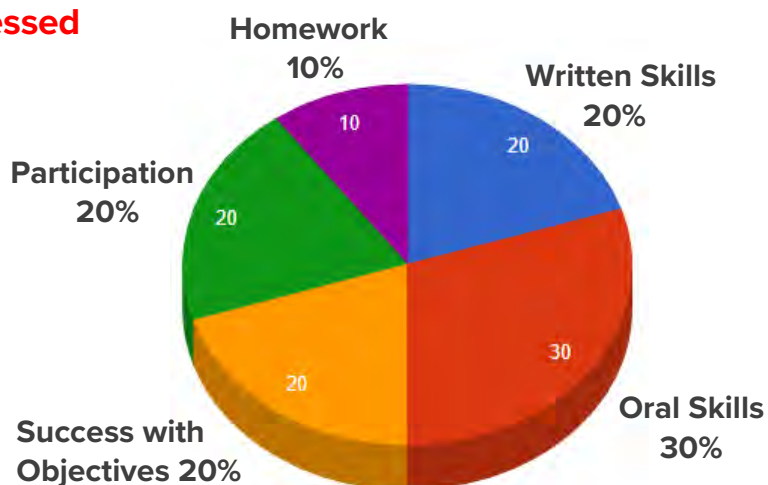

STUDENT PROGRESS

How do I move up to the next level?

Students will be assessed every week in their morning and afternoon classes (if applicable). To move up a level, students must have an 80% or higher attendance rate, AND must have scored EITHER 90% or higher on the last four unit tests OR 80% or higher average on the last eight unit tests. Students who meet these attendance and success criteria will be invited to write a Level test and complete an oral evaluation, based on the entire contents of the 12-week level. Level tests are conducted on Wednesdays; level changes will take effect from Monday of the following week. All language skills will be assessed.

How you are assessed



*If you have elective classes in the afternoon, your total score will be weighted according to the number of lessons you are studying.

SPECIALTY COURSES

In addition to the General English Program (GEP), CES Vancouver has special programs to prepare you for English examinations or specific uses of English.

Do I have to pay extra?

- The tuition is the same for all programs, but if you are only studying 20 lessons per week, you will need to pay to upgrade to 25 or 30 lessons per week.
- Students changing to Cambridge are required to pay an extra fee for the exam, textbook and course materials.

How do I change my program?

- Please talk to the Assistant Director of Studies
- Please note that if the class you want to take is full, or if we don't have enough students in the program you want, a change may not be possible.

School Rules

"ENGLISH ONLY, PLEASE" POLICY

The more you speak English, the faster you will learn. This is why we have a strong "English Only, Please" requirement. This means that English is the only language spoken in class and in the school. We also encourage English Only on activities organized by the school.

We understand that, at times, students might feel homesick or just feel like speaking their own language. This is perfectly normal. If you feel that you need to speak your own language to someone else or on the phone, please go outside or into an empty classroom.

ATTENDANCE

Attendance is mandatory; 80% attendance is required to receive a certificate. However, we understand that sometimes there are unavoidable reasons for missing class (i.e. medical problems, visa concerns, visits by family members, personal emergencies, etc.), so we have developed a policy which is flexible, but sets clear guidelines:

- If a student misses more than 4 classes (in morning or afternoon), they may not be permitted to write the weekly progress test; this will affect a student's grades required for level change.
- To report an absence due to illness, please email the school at vancouver@ces-schools.com or call 877-337-5377.
- CES Vancouver reserves the right to approve or deny an excused absence.

PUNCTUALITY

Please respect your teachers and classmates by arriving on time for class. If you arrive late, this interrupts the class. We ask students to observe the following rules:

- Class begins at 9:00am - please arrive at school before 9:00!
- A student arriving for AM class up to 15 minutes late may be allowed to enter at the discretion of the teacher, who does not have to allow them in. No late arrivals are permitted for PM classes.
- A student who is more than 15 minutes late for the AM class must wait for the next break before joining the class.

HOMEWORK

The academic program developed by Centre of English Studies has been successful for many years with many students. Of course, students are also responsible for their own progress. Homework will be assigned daily, and students are expected to complete it. Your teacher may assign you written homework or exercises from the CES Online platform. You may also do "Solo Study" on the CES online app in your own time.

ACADEMIC HONESTY POLICY

CES Vancouver students are expected to conduct themselves in a trustworthy manner. Cheating on tests or plagiarism on homework or assignments will not be tolerated by the school. If you cheat, you could receive a mark of zero (0) on the test, and further penalties exist for more serious or repeated offenses. CELL PHONES

Please be advised that there is no cell phone use allowed in the classes without permission from your teacher. Please make sure that your phone is off and in your bag when you are in class. Do not text or receive calls in class or, if you must take a call, please leave the class to use the phone. If there is an emergency, please quietly excuse yourself from the classroom.

If the teacher sees you using your phone without permission:

First Time: You will be asked to put your phone away

Second Time: You will be asked to put your phone on the teacher's desk

Repeated failure to follow this rule may result in you being asked to leave the class for the day.

SCENT FREE ZONE

We ask students and staff not to wear perfume, cologne or scented body spray because some staff or students may have allergies to scents. Underarm deodorant is okay. Staff reserve the right to ask you to leave the class or to wash off the perfume.

MASKS IN THE CLASSROOM

Masks are not currently required in private indoor spaces in BC, but any CES student or staff member is welcome to wear a mask if they choose to. Masks are available at the Front Desk.

If you feel sick, please call or email us to let us know and stay home until you feel better and have tested negative for COVID. If you start to feel sick at school, COVID tests are available at the Front Desk.

School Rules

BUILDING REGULATIONS

There is **no smoking** anywhere in the school building. There is also no smoking at the front of the building. **Individuals could be fined up to \$10,000 for smoking near the front doors of a building.** Please cross the street (towards the Steamclock); you can smoke away from the buildings on Cambie Street. Do not stand or smoke within 6 meters of the doors, windows, or air intakes of any building. The entrance of the school building is always locked for security purposes. Students will be issued a door code during the orientation. Otherwise, staff will be at the door to open the door for you from 8:30-9:00am, Monday to Friday. To enter the building at other times please ring the doorbell or phone the front desk and someone will be down to let you in.

FIRE REGULATIONS

If you hear the fire alarm, stay calm. Leave the school immediately using the stairs, and walk to the meeting point at the Steamclock. Make sure to stay with your class and teacher so that we know where you are. Never use the elevators during a fire. If you see smoke or fire but do not hear an alarm, you may pull one of the red fire alarms on the wall. Do not touch these alarms if there is no fire, or you could be fined. Throughout the year, we run planned fire drills and you will be informed of these ahead of time.

EARTHQUAKE SAFETY

Drop, cover and hold on. If you feel the ground shake or receive an alert, immediately drop, cover and hold on.

1. Drop to your hands and knees. If you're inside, stay inside - don't run outdoors or to other rooms.
2. Cover your head and neck with your arm and take shelter under a sturdy piece of furniture. If there is no shelter nearby, crawl to the nearest interior corner or wall while continuing to protect your head and neck.
3. Hold on to your shelter, covering your head and neck until the shaking stops.

RESPECT FOR OTHERS

Remember that your actions and attitude affect the learning of other students. For this reason, we expect our students to remember the importance of the following: participation, commitment, speaking English only, bringing supplies and textbooks, and politeness towards fellow students and teachers. All students and staff are expected to treat each other with respect, regardless of race, religion, national origin, age, gender, sexual orientation, disabilities, marital status, etc. Students have agreed to follow the Statement of Student Rights and Responsibilities available at the front desk. Negative comments or behaviour towards other students or staff are subject to disciplinary action up to and including expulsion without refund.

GROUNDING FOR DISMISSAL

The Assistant Director of Studies, the Principal or the President of Centre of English Studies North America will immediately expel (remove from school permanently) any students involved in any illegal activity including (but not limited to) harassment, discrimination, drug or weapons possession or use, violent or abusive behaviour, being under the influence of drugs and/or alcohol, or theft. Expulsion may be in person, via telephone, or by email; confirmation of a student's expulsion will be sent to the student by email. If the student is a minor, confirmation will also be sent by email to the parent(s)/guardian(s).

CES Registration Policy

Centre of English Studies Refund Policy*

To be considered for a refund, a student must submit a written notice of withdrawal to the Assistant Director of Studies or the Front Office Coordinator.

- If a student cancels their program or is dismissed more than 14 calendar days before the start of the program of study, the school will refund all tuition fees paid under the contract minus a cancellation fee of \$350.
- No refund will be paid if a student cancels or is dismissed when there are fewer than 14 calendar days before the start date.
- The Registration fee and the Homestay Placement fee are always non-refundable.
- If, in the unlikely event that a student is unable to attend lessons because they have contracted a Covid-19 infection, no refund can be claimed.

**Fourteen (14) or more days before the program begins: refund of amount paid, minus \$350.
Fewer than fourteen (14) days before program begins: 0% refund.**

Postponements:

- You need to tell the front desk staff or Assistant Director of Studies before you take any time off
- Holidays must be requested at least 4 weeks in advance.
- Postponements are approved at the school's discretion.

Extensions:

If you want to extend your studies at CES Vancouver

- Please come to speak with any staff member to inquire about studying longer
- Register to extend in advance to ensure your space in your level or program!

Program Changes:

Please make an appointment with the Assistant Director of Studies to help choose the right program for you. The Assistant Director of Studies is available during office hours, Monday to Friday.

- You can change your registration to General English, IELTS Preparation, Cambridge Exam Preparation - or other courses as available - depending on your level.
- Specialty classes such as Cambridge and IELTS require a minimum number of 6 students to open a class.
- These classes fill up quickly, so request your program change early to guarantee your space in the program!

*Please note that the RO/IEC program has specific refund policies; ask at the front desk for details.

CES Student Support and Services

CERTIFICATES

If your attendance is 80% or higher when you graduate, you will receive a certificate to show the lessons you studied at Centre of English Studies. On your last Friday, there will be a graduation ceremony where you will be presented with your certificate. If you are absent on your last day, you can request to receive your certificate early or contact us to request the certificate be mailed to you. Additional or replacement certificates are available for a fee of \$25.00 + postage (if applicable).

TRANSCRIPTS

Our academic transcript is a page showing all courses completed with final grades and attendance. Transcripts are automatically prepared for scholarship organizations as required. If you would like a copy of your transcript, it can be requested from the Director of Studies. Transcripts can also be emailed or sent by post (fee applies).

ACADEMIC COUNSELING

The Assistant Director of Studies will invite students to a meeting to talk about their academic goals and program options at specific points during their study period. Students can also request additional appointments with the Assistant Director of Studies at any time.

LOCAL INFORMATION

If you have any questions about anything relating to life in Vancouver, from what to do on the weekend to where you can open a bank account, please feel free to ask the staff at the Front Desk. Many local restaurants and shops will give you a discount if you show your CES student card!

CELLPHONES

Prepaid cellphone plans are available through most providers and are often the best option for international students. You will need your passport, study permit/eTA, and a credit card. In Vancouver some of the popular providers are Rogers, Telus, Bell, Fido, Virgin Mobile, and Freedom Mobile. Be sure to use an authorized dealer for prepaid phone plans. Ask at the Front Desk if you need recommendations!

PRINTING/PHOTOCOPYING SERVICE

Printing and photocopying services are available for students for a fee. Please inquire at the Front Desk.



Activities

CES Vancouver organizes a variety of activities such as visiting local attractions, sports and outdoor activities, and day trips to other areas near Vancouver.

Some activities are free while others have a fee, but ALL CES Vancouver students are welcome and encouraged to participate!

CALENDAR

The activity calendar outlines the activities for that week and details like cost and when and where to meet. The calendar is posted on the activity board.

HOW TO SIGN UP

To sign up, please speak write your name on the activity sign-up sheet or talk to the activity leader or CES Staff at the Front Desk. Please note that a lot of activities require making reservations in advance, so only sign up for an activity if you are 100% sure you can participate!

For most activities, the deadline for sign up will be 2 days in advance. Some activities will have an earlier deadline, so please check the calendar for more details!

FEES/HOW TO PAY

Some activities will have a fee to participate, to cover entrance/ticket fees, transportation (if we are not using public transportation), etc.

Please note that CES does not cover the fees for food/drinks, shopping, and public transportation during events (unless otherwise noted) and you will need to pay these costs yourself.

For paid activities you will need to make the payment when signing up to secure a space. You can pay at the CES Front Desk. Do **not** book/pay for tickets/bookings directly unless you have been asked by CES Staff to do so! Very often CES has arranged for lower prices or special group tickets that you can only get through the school.

CANCELLATIONS

If you have signed up for an activity but cannot make it, please let the staff know in person or by phone as soon as possible! For paid activities, there usually will **not** be a refund, so please make sure you are committed to participating when you make a booking!

Activities may be canceled by CES if there are not enough participants or other reasons such as weather. If CES cancels the activity, you will be refunded for any fees you've paid.



Transportation

PUBLIC TRANSIT IN VANCOUVER

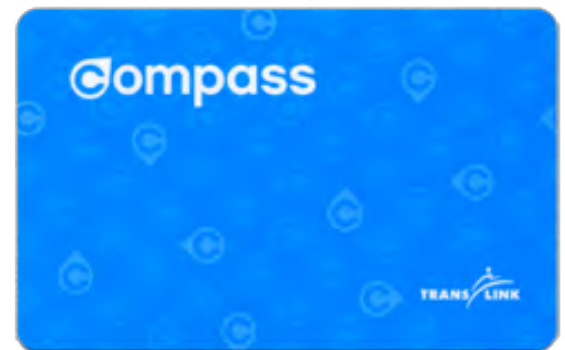
The transit system in Vancouver is operated by TransLink, served by three SkyTrain lines, a large network of bus lines, and a SeaBus that connects Vancouver to the North Shore.

FARES AND ZONES

You can pay by cash or card, or use the "Compass Card." You can pre-load cash value onto the Compass Card. If you pay with the Compass Card, the fare is slightly cheaper. Your fare will depend on how many "zones" you travel through, and one payment is valid for 90 minutes.

A 1-zone fare for adults is \$3.35 if you pay with cash or credit card, or \$2.70 if you pay using the Compass Card.

Fares are subject to change; for a full list of current fares, check the Translink website at <https://www.translink.ca/transit-fares>



COMPASS CARD

You can purchase and load a Compass Card at a ticket machine at any SkyTrain station. When you board the bus/enter the SkyTrain station, you just tap your card and the fare is deducted automatically. Make sure you register your Compass Card online. Ask us for help!

MONTHLY PASSES

A monthly pass gives you unlimited rides for that calendar month. You will need a Compass Card to purchase a monthly pass.

Monthly pass prices (adult): 1 zone - \$111.60 2 zones - \$149.25 3 zones - \$201.55

(Prices are current as of October, 2025 and subject to change.)

TIMETABLES AND ROUTES

The SkyTrains and Seabuses run on a set time schedule, while the the buses will run at regular intervals but the exact time schedule can vary depending on traffic conditions. The best way to plan your trip is on Google Maps.

OUTSIDE VANCOUVER

There are some bus/train/ferry options available for visiting other areas like Whistler/Squamish, Lower Mainland, Vancouver Island and Seattle. Ask the Front Desk staff for more details!

SMOKING

In BC, you must be at least 19 years old to buy/smoke/vape tobacco. You cannot smoke within 6 meters of any doors, air intakes or open windows to any public building or work place. There is also no smoking/vaping permitted in most restaurants, bars, cafes, etc. Please note that there is no smoking/vaping allowed within the CES Vancouver campus or outside the building.

ALCOHOL

The legal drinking age in BC is 19, and you will also need to be over 19 to enter bars, pubs, clubs and liquor stores where alcohol is sold. Two pieces of ID (one with your photo/birthday on it, like your passport, and another with your name on it, like a bank/credit card) are required to purchase alcohol. Drinking or having open cans/bottles of alcohol in public is illegal in BC, including in parks and on public transportation, and you may be fined if you get caught. **Vancouver is temporarily allowing the consumption of alcohol in certain public parks, subject to change. Check park signage!*

TIPPING

To “tip” means to give a bit of extra money to someone, such as a waiter, waitress, bartender, hairdresser or delivery person, to show that you appreciate the service that you have received. The usual tip is 15~20% of your bill before taxes. For example, if you are in a restaurant and your bill comes to \$20 before taxes, you should add an extra \$3~4 to the payment. When you are in a bar and you order a drink, you should tip the server or bartender at least \$0.50 per drink. Some other times you may be expected to tip are: at a hairdresser, when you get a food delivery, when you take a taxi, etc. You are not expected to tip at fast-food restaurants although it is always nice to do so.

SHOPPING AND TAXES

The prices shown at most restaurants and stores do not include sales tax. There are two types of sales taxes, GST (Goods and Services Tax, 5%) and PST (Provincial Sales Tax, 7%). Most goods and services will be charged a 12% tax on top of the price shown, although some items are only charged the 5% GST.

Cash is becoming less and less common, and contactless payment methods (debit/credit) are becoming mainstream. Keep in mind that some restaurants and shops will not accept cash.

STAYING SAFE

Vancouver is a very safe city, but you should always take take caution. Some tips include:

- Always keep an eye on your personal belongings and don't leave anything unattended in public places
- Pickpockets are rare, but always be aware of your surroundings
- Stay in well-lit areas at night and avoid meeting strangers in unknown/isolated places
- Look after yourself and your friends at bars and clubs, especially if you are drinking
- Homelessness and drug use is present in some areas of town, in particular the Downtown Eastside. There is no need for unnecessary fear based on appearances or stereotypes, but do be cautious when you are in these areas.

CANNABIS

As of October 17, 2018, cannabis has been legal in Canada in small amounts for personal use for people who are 19+ years old. Cannabis is a plant that is used as a drug. It has many other names and slang terms, including marijuana, weed or pot.

Remember, just because it is legal does not mean everyone is comfortable to be around cannabis, and not everyone will be comfortable talking about it. Use your judgement. If you choose to use cannabis in Canada, it is important to know the law and the risks.

What is Legal in Canada?

- Buying cannabis from a government-run store, licensed private stores, or the BC government online store.
- Carrying small amounts (up to 30 grams) of cannabis in public.
- Using cannabis in a private residence with the owner's permission or outside in a place where smoking is permitted.

What is NOT Legal?

- It is NOT LEGAL to buy cannabis for or give cannabis to anyone under 19 years old
- It is NOT LEGAL sell cannabis to anyone
- It is NOT LEGAL carry more than 30 grams of cannabis in public
- It is NOT LEGAL smoke or vape cannabis indoors or anywhere smoking cigarettes is illegal
- It is NOT LEGAL smoke or vape cannabis within 20 meters of a playground or sports field
- It is NOT LEGAL drive while under the influence of cannabis
- It is NOT LEGAL take cannabis out of Canada to another country

While cannabis use is legal in Canada and it is your choice whether or not you use it, CES Vancouver DOES NOT ENDORSE the use of cannabis. It is still prohibited to smoke or vape cannabis in your homestay, at school, or in and around school property, or anywhere smoking is prohibited. Coming to school under the influence of cannabis is also prohibited.

CONSULATES

Consulates are official offices of your country located in a different country. They can help you with questions regarding visas, passports, and other services offered by your home country. Visit your country's consulate website to find their contact information and services offered.

PLACES OF WORSHIP

Vancouver is a very multicultural city and you will likely be able to find a place where you can continue to practice your religion. Many resources are available online, but if you need help finding a place for a specific religion, please do not hesitate to ask the Front Desk staff!

HEALTH INSURANCE

Health care can be very expensive in Canada and it is very important that you have health insurance during your stay. **The public health insurance from your home country will not cover you in Canada.** If you are on a study permit or working holiday visa and staying over six months, you may be eligible for the BC health program (MSP); however, most short-term visitors will not be eligible and will need to arrange travel insurance.

If you have not arranged travel insurance yet, CES Vancouver can assist you to enroll with an insurance provider who offers competitive rates and excellent coverage.

WHERE TO GET MEDICAL / DENTAL ASSISTANCE

In Canada most people have a *family doctor* who is the first person to visit if you need medical assistance. For international visitors without a family doctor, a walk-in clinic will be the best option if you need to see a doctor. At a walk-in clinic, you can usually see a doctor without an appointment; however, many clinics now require an appointment ahead of time. Please make sure you check if the clinic you plan to visit is taking walk-in patients or if you need to make an appointment.

There are also several "Urgent and Primary Care Centres" where you can be treated for non-emergency injuries and illnesses. Please note that hospitals and specialists will not see you unless you have a referral from a clinic.

If you have an urgent, life-threatening illness or injury, visit the Emergency Department at a hospital or call 911. If you need help finding a medical or dental clinic, ask the CES staff at the front desk. Always check with the clinic beforehand if you are able to use your insurance and if you will need to pay yourself or if the clinic can charge the insurance company directly.

COVID-19 AND MASKS

Masks are generally no longer required in BC (including public indoor spaces), however some hospitals, clinics, and businesses may ask you to wear a mask. Masks are not required on public transit but it is encouraged, especially if you are feeling unwell. (Information is current as of **Oct 2025** and subject to change. CES Vancouver will follow all directives issued by the BC Ministry of Health and/or the Government of Canada.)

HELPLINES

There are many phone lines that offer free advice regarding your physical and mental health.

8-1-1

8-1-1 is a service operated by the Ministry of Health that can help you find health information and services, as well as connect you directly to a health care professional.

BC Mental Health Support Line 310-6789 (No area code)

The line is available 24 hours day for advice and support regarding your mental health.

BC Alcohol and Drug Information and Referral Service 1-800-663-1441

They offer advice and support regarding alcohol and drug addiction for yourself or someone you know.

Sex Sense 1-800-739-7367

They offer information and resources on sex, sexuality, and sexual health including STDs, pregnancy and birth control.

Suicide Crisis Helpline 9-8-8

They give people access to suicide prevention services via call or text.

Homestay

If you have any questions or inquiries about your homestay speak to Sae at the Front Desk. The CES Emergency telephone number is +1 604 362 4965. Communication is the most important thing to ensure you have a good homestay experience. When in doubt, always ask your homestay what their expectations are. If you are having trouble speaking to them yourself, CES Staff is always here to help!

WHAT IS A CANADIAN?

Canada is largely a country of immigrants. Canadians come from all over the world and this multiculturalism makes Canada the great country that it is. All of our homestay families are Canadian, although they may have been born elsewhere. They have chosen our wonderful country and they have chosen to share their experiences and family history with you.

YOUR FAMILY

Your host family is a family with their own dynamics, rules and schedules. Your family has chosen to host because they want to welcome you into their family. Most families work full-time, they may have children that are involved in activities, and they are part of an extended family. Families help one another, so they may ask you to do light duties such as setting the table for dinner or bringing your dishes to the sink. This makes you part of their family.

MEALS

- Families provide food for 2 or 3 meals per day according to your registration. It is the family's responsibility to provide the food for your meals and to make dinner every night.
- Dinner is usually the biggest meal. This should be a well-balanced meal. Breakfast will usually be simple and self-service items like cereal, toast, eggs, fruit, etc.
- ***It is a student's responsibility to make their own breakfast and lunch (if applicable). Please talk to your host and tell them what you like and dislike, and ask the host where the food is kept so that you can make your own.***
- ***If you have chosen full-board homestay, your Host Family will provide you with food for lunches; you can take your lunch to school on weekdays. Lunch is usually a sandwich, a piece of fruit or a snack, and a drink.***
- Please advise your host family of any food allergies and foods you like/dislike. It is important to tell your hosts this information. Do not worry; they will not be upset to hear that there is something that you do not like. However keep in mind that homestays are not required to cook food from your country.
- Food between meal times is considered snacks. If your family is enjoying a snack together, then they will include you.
- Any additional snacks, drinks, specialty foods, or brand name items must be purchased by you.
- If you will be late for dinner or will be eating out, notify your homestay by a time agreed to (for example, by 4pm).

Homestay

LANGUAGE

All host families speak English, although some may have a different first language or have an accent. Accents provide students with excellent practice for life in Vancouver, for international business communication, for traveling around the world, and for taking exams like IELTS and Cambridge First/Advanced. It is important to “train” your ear for these accents and take advantage of the great practice opportunity.

YOUR BEDROOM

- Your bedroom will be completely private with a door that fully closes. You will have a bed, a desk with lamp, and a place where you can store your clothes, like a closet.
- You will be given items like towels, bedding, bed linen, etc.
- Your homestay host will respect your privacy and will not go into your bedroom without permission, unless it is absolutely necessary.
- You should clean your room and empty the garbage at least once a week.
- Do not eat or store food in your bedroom as this may attract insects and cause a bad smell.
- You should not leave a lot of money in your room. For safe keeping, excess money should either be put into a bank account or changed into travelers cheques.

BATHROOMS

- Shared items like toilet paper will be provided, but you will need to provide your own consumable items such as a toothbrush, toothpaste, shampoo/conditioner, make up, moisturizer, deodorant, etc.
- Hot water tanks can be small and are used by the whole family, so you should avoid taking very long showers (over 10-15 minutes). It is also not common for Canadian families to take a bath (in the bathtub) every day.
- The hot water is also used for the kitchen, dishwashers, etc., and you may need to plan the time when you take a shower.
- You should always clean up after yourself after using the washroom. Clean up any hair or garbage, and wipe up any water on counters and floors.
- Canadian bathrooms don't have drains in the floor! Close the shower curtain and take care not to spray water on the floor when taking a shower.

LAUNDRY

- You can use the washer/dryer and laundry detergent at the homestay for free.
- You will usually have to do your own laundry (your homestay will not do laundry for you). Ask your homestay host to show you how to use the machine if you don't know.
- You should not use the laundry every day; wait until you have a full load and keep washings to once a week. You can speak to your family about what their expectations are.

HOUSE KEYS

You will get a key to your homestay. Your family has trusted you with the key to their house and you should take special care and responsibility. Be careful not to lose the key and always lock the door when leaving the house.

BE ENVIRONMENTALLY FRIENDLY

- Being environmentally friendly means trying to reduce negative impact on the Earth by reducing waste and conserving electricity and water.
- To save electricity, turn off the lights and appliances when you leave a room.
- Dress warmly in the house so you do not have to turn up the heat as high.
- Keep showers short (under 10-15 minutes) and turn off the hot water when not in use.
- Recycle: this means separating your garbage by type (paper, cans, bottles, plastics, food waste). Talk to your family to see what their expectations/rules are.

HAVING GUESTS AND CURFEW

- If you wish to invite a guest to visit your homestay, including staying overnight, you must ask your family for permission in advance.
- Your homestay family may have a curfew. This means they expect you to be home by a certain time every night. You are expected to follow the curfew, or ask for permission if you need them to make an exception.
- If you will be spending the night outside the house, you must contact your homestay and get permission.

INTERNET

Your homestay will have an internet connection. The internet is shared by the whole family and there may be limits on data, so you should avoid downloading large files like movies.

SMOKING

Smoking is not permitted inside. If you smoke, ask your family if you can smoke outside the house, and where you should do so. Always make sure your cigarette is completely extinguished, and throw it out in the right place.

CANCELLATIONS AND EXTENSIONS

If you wish to cancel or extend your homestay, please see Sae at the front desk. A **two-week notice period is required to cancel your homestay**. Extensions will be accepted when full payment has been received. It is recommended that you give as much notice as possible; please note that you may need to change families if another student has already been placed with your current family after your original check-out date.

CONCERNS WITH YOUR HOMESTAY

If you are having issues with your host family, please be sure to speak to a CES staff member right away. They are here to help you make your homestay experience a pleasant one! All information will be kept confidential.

Homestay Cancellation and Refund Policy

1

Where a person has contracted for a period of homestay and gives **notice 12 WEEKS OR MORE BEFORE ARRIVAL** of their intention not to commence the homestay program, all money will be refunded **including** the homestay placement fee.

2

Where a person has contracted for a period of homestay and gives **notice LESS THAN 12 WEEKS AND MORE THAN TWO WEEKS BEFORE ARRIVAL** of their intention not to commence the homestay program, all money will be refunded **except** the homestay placement fee.

3

Where a person has contracted for a period of homestay and gives notice to leave the homestay program **AFTER ARRIVAL OR LESS THAN TWO WEEKS BEFORE ARRIVAL**, a minimum of two weeks' notice is required for any refund, unless the family has failed to meet the conditions outlined in the homestay manual.

4

Where a person has contracted for a period of homestay and fails to **GIVE NOTICE OF EXTENSION OF THE HOMESTAY PERIOD THREE WEEKS OR MORE BEFORE THE END OF THE HOMESTAY PERIOD**, there will be no guarantee of homestay extension.

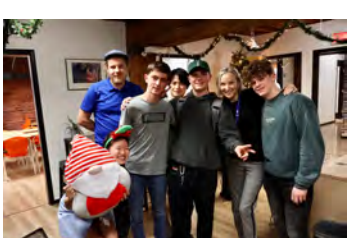
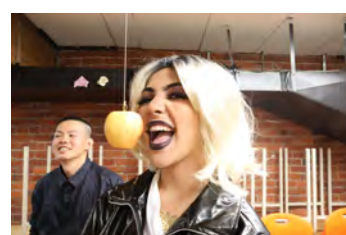

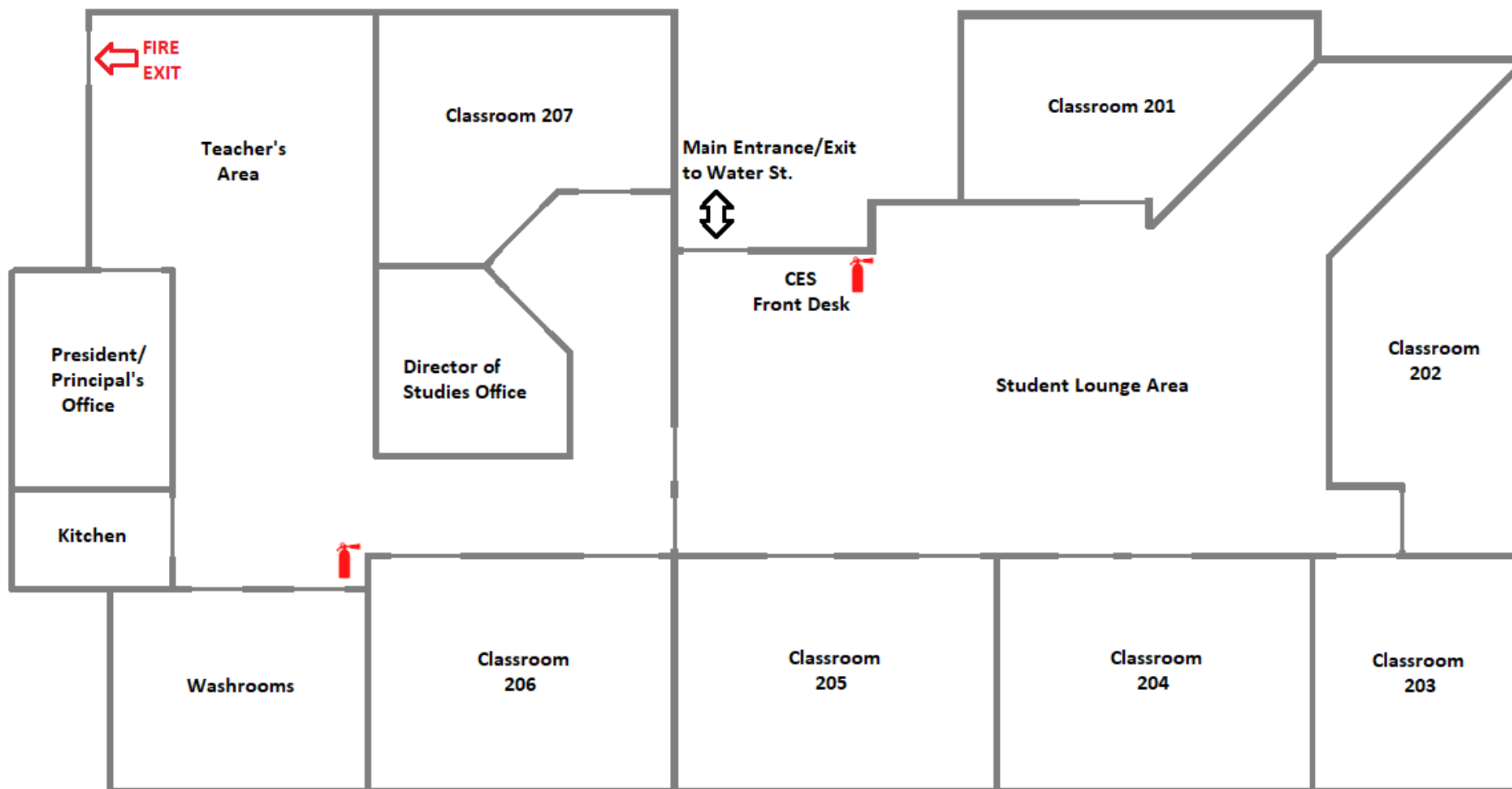
